

## Second Line

A New Orleans Second Line is a vibrant and culturally significant tradition that encapsulates the heart and soul of the city's musical and social heritage. Originating in the brass band parades of the late 19th century, the Second Line has evolved into a dynamic fusion of music, dance, and community celebration. At its core, the Second Line represents a joyous display of collective spirit, where a brass band leads the procession while revelers, known as the "second line," follow with exuberant dancing, twirling parasols, and lively expressions of festivity.
