Thanks to the help of another fan, the photographs were eventually recovered and returned.

The idea of someone breaking in through the bathroom window always brings a smile to my face, since our bathroom is three stories above ground, and even the tallest ladders would be challenged to reach it.

For this series, I've asked a model, Tryst, to pretend to come in through our bathroom window, and then to prance and dance around the room, as I imagine the joyous fan must have done when she broke into Paul McCartney's house nearly fifty years ago.
